

Write your own Spanish book with 100 Days of Spanish

What can you learn from Day 2 of 100 Days of Spanish? I find it so frustrating when I study a language ineffectively and I can't think of anything I know how to say off the top of my head. This has happened when I have studied with online apps, but it won't happen to me any more ... and it needn't happen to you either. All you need to do is follow these steps, and we can take Day 2 as a working example.

1. Know what you know EN INGLÉS first and foremost. To remember what you know, COUNT!

2. Write out the sentences. Imagine yourself saying them. Make flashcards (I like these ones <https://amzn.to/32a7s2e>) and put them around the house, then use them to test yourself regularly. Try saying the sentences with feeling. Try to imagine different contexts. Could you say them in anger, in passion, in sadness or in excitement? Record

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yourself saying them and use the recording as your alarm tone, or as ring tones for different contacts in your address book.

3. When the Spanish sentences are out of reach and out of sight, test yourself to see how much you can say all by yourself. You know how many are in your target for this group, because you have studied el inglés y has memorizado that there is un grupo de 3 and then four pairs.

So can you reel off 11 sentences en español? If you can, just after one lesson, imagine how far you can get if you continue in the same way and finish el curso. 100 Days of Spanish is my introduction to Spanish, and Spanish for Beginners with Pasos is a longer course that I have taught since 2009. Students always had to pay for this course ... until now. The lessons I make for students on YouTube are free, and I will tell you why in a moment, but first, let's get those 11 sentences in Spanish.

1. Quiero clase número uno
2. Quiero amigos
3. Quiero una barra de chocolate
4. Quiero hablar inglés
5. Quiero practicar español
6. Quiero imaginar en español
7. Quiero una conversación en inglés
8. Inglés es mucho más fácil
9. Español es mucho más fácil
10. Mucho de inglés es similar al español
11. Mucho de español es similar al inglés

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You could play around with the blocks of these sentences to make más variaciones, I am sure. That is up to you. 11 is a good start. Now, I said I was going to tell you why my lessons are free for you to access.

I am very interested in the science of learning. In my years as a teacher, since 1998, I have developed my own theories as I constantly re-invented the way I taught and continue to teach. I developed a method of teaching Spanish that involved using as much español as people can understand while continuing to include some inglés until people are ready to learn by immersion. I began to write books to make my method available for everyone.

I read about how babies learn language. I read about how different people acquire additional languages. I read about how humans learn more generally and about the kind of things we learn easily, and how we learn them easily. I read about psychology, about how to let go of my own barriers and I found lots of mighty academics in the fields of language aquisition and the science of learning whose theory supports what I have chosen to do in practical terms for beginners and elementary students of Spanish.

If you want to learn Spanish, you need to expose yourself to as much Spanish as you can understand. You can do that by watching 100 Days of Spanish ... the Spanish is maximized, as I do in my classes, and el inglés is there so your attention doesn't drift away. You can continue to do that by watching the Spanish for Beginners with Pasos course.

Making the effort with exercises like the one I have set for you here is something you do consciously. It is important. But the vast majority of your learning happens when you absorb Spanish like a sponge by paying attention to the Spanish in the videos and in the books. I have written enough for now.
